

Kincaid for around 40 years. In 1911, he was described in Vernon's directory as "physician and surgeon, diseases of women and children, office and residence 161 King W." Early on he developed, produced and patented 'Dr Williams' Pink Pills for Pale People'. In 1890, Williams sold the rights to George T. Fulford for \$53.01. The pills became an international success through heavy marketing by Fulford. Jackson was born about 1853 and died Jan. 29, 1935.

ceased to exist by 1931. In this building, a larger door was put in to accommodate cars coming in and out. By 1925, it was simply Mackey Motor Sales. The business became Warren O'Hara Motor Supply Co. by 1928. The location also was a Shell gas station and sold Firestone tires.

Mackey & Stack Motor Sales opened around 1922 on the corner, owned by Ernest S. Mackey and Thomas J. Stack. They sold vehicles from

Durant Motors Inc., advertising Durant & Star. Durant Motors Inc. was started by former General Motors CEO William "Billy" Durant in 1921 and

Harlin Gifts opened in 1988 by Linda Hutchins, becoming Big Boys-Harlin Gifts around 1996. It had a side business, 'Big Boys-Harlin Promotions'. The gift shop closed around 2002. Colonial Flower & Gift Shoppe opened in this location in 1994 by Mrs Marilyn Gill. From their information, "Colonial Flowers & Gift Shoppe

has been hand-delivering premium floral arrangements and gift baskets to help strengthen relationships..." Sequence Gaming started out as The Comic Cave in 1990 at 5 Perth St and was owned by Richard Benoit. It moved up the street to 25 Perth St

around 1996. Benoit had it for many years, with it transferring to Pierre & Jan Sigman after 2007. It was then purchased by Bryan Treffers with a partner on May 14, 2010. The business was then renamed Sequence Comic and Gaming on Aug. 22, 2010. In Oct. 2019, there was a move to this current location of 165 King St. W., having dropped the comic sales shortly before moving, giving it the altered name of Sequence Gaming. They

advertise that "Sequence is the spot to find and play Pokémon, Magic: the Gathering, Flesh & Blood TCG, Warhammer." Treffers has been the constant owner of this establishment since 2010, with several partners through the years. His current partner is Derek Paul.
