

"Dr. Robert Edmondson opened his office in his new stone building at the s.e.c. of King St. W. and St. Paul St." (Brockville Recorder entry, November 16, 1831.)

Built for Dr. Robert Edmondson, who lived here and believed to have had a pharmaceuticals store here. Edmondson was a physician until his death as he is listed in the business directory of 1871, the year of his death. Edmondson biography

Robert McCormack also lived in the building where his store was (#213/1880s/#219/current).

The barborshop and music shop of Nelson and Bill Weathereil was here for many years.

A cutout from Herman Brosius's 1874 drawing map of Brockville at the top of this page shows the original buildings as first constructed (from the back). The most important thing with this view is that it shows the peaked roofline all the way through all sections of the building. At some point in the late 1800s, a partial third floor was added with six dormer windows and a fancy cornice, which survives to this day. The two sections were presumably under different ownership at that time.

The Dutch Store of the late 1950s and early 1960s sold appliances, electronics, furniture, etc. Their motto was 'The Store With Friendly Service'. They did not have a long life.

Reliable Furniture first opened in Brockville Nov. 1, 1968. Reliable tore off the original front ground floor architecture and modernized it, with a more "store" look. c1981, saw Reliable with a major expansion, taking over the entire Edmondson Block, all 4 storefronts 215-223, but giving up the end one (223) by mid decade. As the business slowly shrank over the years, they closed out in this building c2010. Reliable's last location across the street from here at 224 King St. W. was closed in early 2019. This was just in time, about a year before the Pandemic hit.
