George A. Rudd shows as a saddler and harnessmaker on King St, 1882 business directory. Rudd came to Brockville in 1882.

By 1895, he employed 14 or 15 men in his business by his account. G.A. Rudd moved over to the Central Block in 1899, leaving this spot for Charles (son?). The succeeding Charles R. Rudd, harness shop business may have been smaller. A second spot says "vacant". This business was established in 1899. By 1910 Charles Rudd also moved over to the Central Block. The building was divided into three shops as


G.A. Rudd & Co. seems to have occupied the entire ground floor of this block as no other businesses were listed in the

directories before 1900. He was not only a harness dealer, but had a major harness and carriage top manufacturing business here.


Interesting, the ever moving Camera Centre started out in this block at #176, then moved accross the street for a time, then moved back to this block at #180. <u>Info</u>




