The building appears in Brosius's 1874 drawing map of Brockville, so was there at that point. It may have been built in the 1850s. Being brick, it does not seem to be any older.

They continued on for many years, until around 1940.

The Mrs J. Beach, millinery (#6*) and ladies fancy goods existed in the early 1880s. Beach lived just around the corner at (6) Market St. The Steben & Barcelow (#6*), plumbers steam & gas fitters was owned by Fred Steben and J.D. Barcelow. Steben lived in what was later 82 Water St. E. (Four Winds parking lot) but demolished in the 1960s. He was also was manager of the Water Works. Barcelow lived on <u>James St W.</u> (current Catholic Church/School

The Seven Cent Store (#8*) openened in the early 1880s by George Troutbeck, who lived above the store. Around 1888, the business was acquired by A. Chase,

Thomas A. Wood, grocery (#6*) was opened around 1893. He lived at (43) Charles St. In 1896, Wood was replaced by H.T. Murray, who had the grocery into the first decade of the new century. Murray resided at (32) Broad St. It was then taken over by Bell & Ryan's wholesale fruit business. Both George A Bell and Thomas H. Ryan lived at 70 Pearl St. W. It's closing about 1914 ended over 20 years as a food outlet here.

J.R. Bresnan & Son, coal & wood (#6), operated from c1914 to c1918. Their motto was "The Coal Men". Bresnan had previously worked for George E. Sheilds & Co. and lived at 106 Pine St. Around 1918, Bresnan moved his business to 32 King St. W. where he continued for another 3 decades. Fred H. Kay started out as an apholsterer for Robert Sheridan. He then took over an existing apholstering business about 1914 from W.C. Waldren. Around 1918,

R. Sheridan & Co. (#8*), stoves, tinsmiths, moved here from the corner of King & Garden around 1892. It was mainly Robert Sheridan's business, but he was in partnership with Thomas Sheridan and John Power. By 1899, Robert had left the business and it was taken over by the other two, becoming Sheridan & Power.

206 King St. E. Stationary became a main focus with the name change to Kay Stationary Store. It closed by 1953. Pleets Clothing Store (#8) was opened by Penney Pleet around 1940. Pleet lived with his wife Dora at 67 Buell St, which no longer exists. The store had closed by the end of the 1950s.

he moved the business to this block and expanded it. He dropped the upholstering and focused on novelties, along with the pictures, picture frames, phonographs and records offered before. To these, he added musical instruments and merchandise, sporting goods and toys. In these later years, Kay, with wife Sadie, moved to

Ford Electric Co. started out here in the late 1950s by Luke Vanclenberg and Henk Breimer. Henk and Rita resided at 25 Salisbury Ave. Luke and Elsa resided at 93 King St. E. They advertised at the time "Electrical Contractors, Specialized Electric Heat, Full Line Moffat, Admiral, Blaupunkt, Stereophonic Appliances". There was a store here selling supplies and fixtures. Around 1970, Ford moved to 23 Perth St. By this point it was Breimer's business. Hank Bouwer took over

located here, until about 1996. Leeds had been in business since c1975, owned by first by Mrs. & Mrs. Carl Smith, then by Mrs. and located at 83 Buell St. Brockville Restaurant (#8), owned by Demetre "Jim" Lerikos, opened about 1968 a few doors down at 22 King St. E, in the Field Building. Lerikos owned the business for 45 years, according to his obituary. It made the move to it's long time location (#8) about 1979. It became **Brockville Restaurant & Steak House** c1996. The restaurant expanded eastward into the French building next door around the millenium, 2000. Beginning to share the location with the Phoenix Eatery

Owen R. Davis's real estate (#6) had a long tenure here from the late 1950s to about 1991. Davis lived with his wife Pearl at 103 James St. E. Davis had ceased

running the business c1962. J. Dean Seaton, who lived with his wife Phyllis at 157 Hartley St., then became President. It then became Leeds Realty, when they re-


